Opening Reflection by the Revd Geoffrey Clarke Moderator of the East Midlands Synod

Strangely Warmed This Summer

Dear Friends,

I serve as The United Reformed Church's representative to the **Methodist Conference**. This year's meeting – in Leeds – was a particular delight personally as the **Revd Helen Cameron** commenced her year of office as President of Conference.



Helen was, until mid-June, Chair of **Northampton Methodist District**, and as such she and I have worked together closely, particularly in Milton Keynes. I was delighted to be invited to lead one of the Conference early morning Communion services and took as my focus the gospel episode that framed my recent sabbatical: Mary's visitation to Elizabeth (Luke 1: 39-45, 56).

I took the risk of offending my Methodist friends by suggesting that Wesley was not the first person to have his heart “strangely warmed”. (Wesley’s personal religious experience on 24 May 1738 – at a meeting in a Moravian meeting house on Aldersgate Street in London, while someone was reading from Martin Luther's Preface to the Epistle to the Romans - was so transformative that in his Journal he wrote that he felt that his heart was “strangely warmed”.) When Mary enters her house and greets her Elizabeth’s child leapt in her womb and she is filled with the Holy Spirit (Luke 1: 41, 44). Her heart is strangely warmed. Mary’s presence – as Theotokos (God-bearer) – is such that in their encounter Elizabeth catches **a glimpse of grace**. She addresses Mary and says, “Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb”. (Luke 1: 42). Elizabeth’s words have been immortalised in the ancient prayer, ‘Hail Mary’ – prayed daily across the ages and continents. The ‘Hail Mary’ acclaims that she is **full of grace** – words lifted from Gabriel’s greeting to her (Luke 1: 28). It is in their **encounter** that grace is glimpsed. Well before she preaches (in her Magnificat – Luke 1: 46-55), it is her **presence** that enables Elizabeth to glimpse grace.

Much of the grace I have glimpsed has been through encounters – presence as much as if not more than preaching. And Mary embodies the clue for us. She is full of grace – rather than full of herself. For grace to be glimpsed, we need to be willing to make space to be full of grace rather than full of ourselves and our self-interest. In his challenging book, *Black, Gay, British, Christian, Queer**, **Fr**

Jarel Robinson-Brown laments what he calls **the famine of grace** in the Church. He cites **Barbara Glasson's** challenge that how we worship, the language we use, and the way we conduct ourselves as Church impacts real life:

If liturgy is the spoken language of the Church, then there is also the need to consider its body language. By this, I mean the way in which church communities present themselves in unspoken ways. It is said that 96 per cent of all communication is non-verbal, and this is true of institutions as well as individuals. It is these unspoken messages that often say more about mission than the words that come out of our mouths. (Robinson-Brown, p. 108)

Sadly it is not rare for us, as followers of Jesus, to obscure grace rather than embody it. For any of us who enter the arena of social media it does not take long for us to spot the famine of grace. Emails, text messages and more – all of these can be used as weapons rather than for grace. And our meetings and dialogue – all too often hearts can be hurt rather than strangely warmed. In *how we act and speak* as much as – if not more than – *what* we think we are conveying.

May we be known as those who are *full of grace* so that others may catch glimpses of grace through how we act and speak... even if sometimes grace has to make its nest on our shoulders (as this bird made its nest on St Hugo's shoulders at St Mary Magdalene's, Oxford).

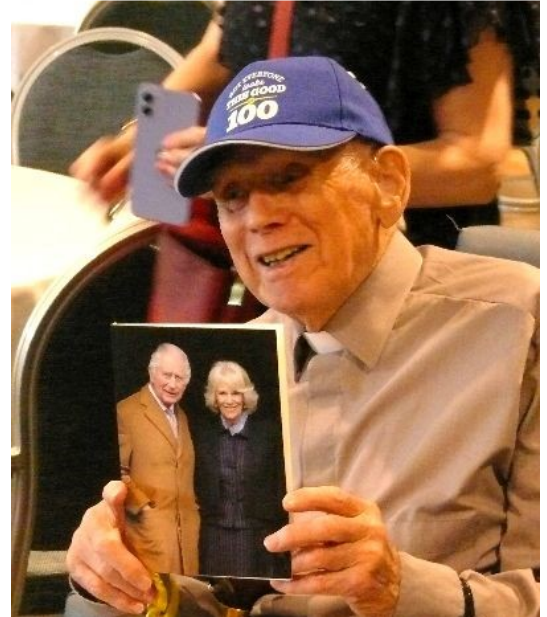
One young person said: 'I was worried, like, oh no 9 hours!! But the time has just flown passed. It's been an awesome day!'

Eco News

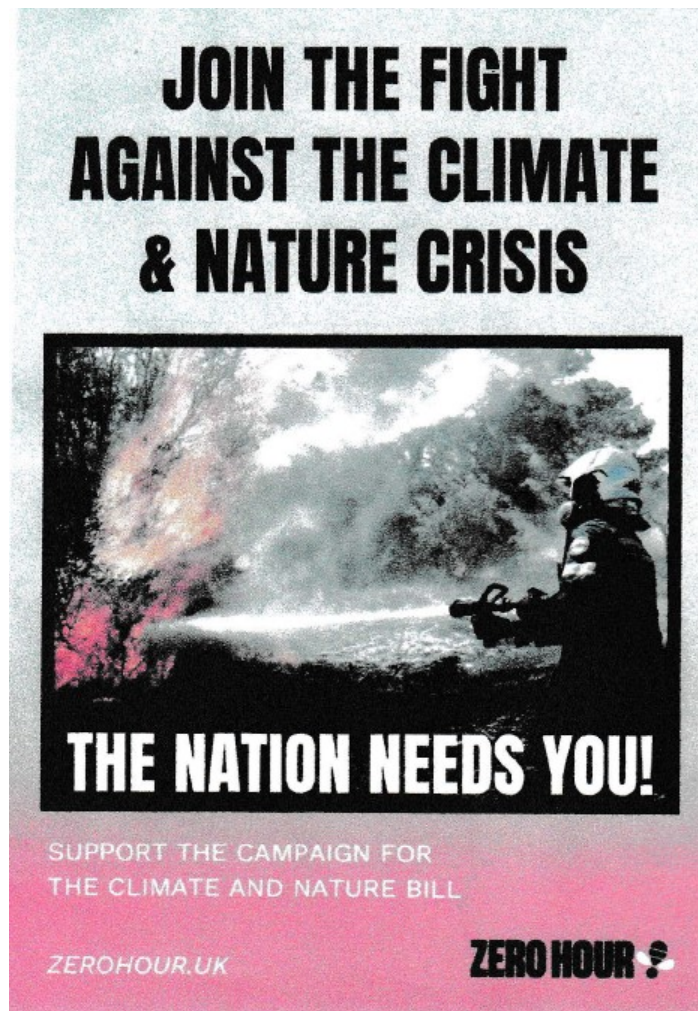
***Charles Jolly** shares the following update on behalf of our **JPIC** group (Justice, Peace and the Integrity of Creation):*

With the General Election, Wimbledon and the Euros over, and in the hopeful spirit of the Olympics, we must once again roll up our sleeves and move heaven and earth to help save the Earth from catastrophic climate change. As Ignatius (or Augustine?) reportedly said: 'Pray as though everything depended on God; act as though everything depended on you.'

The world has only six years left (little more than the life of our new Parliament) to halve greenhouse gas emissions if we hope to keep global warming within (or close to) 1.5°C this century. Yet in the 2019 General Election, climate change and the climate emergency got much less attention than in 2019 (*source: AKAS UK General Election Media Tracker*).

The reality is that, however much we do personally, only government and industry can achieve the systemic change needed. There are indeed many promising initiatives, although not enough and not quickly enough. Maybe only societal pressure from the 'grass roots' will impel our new government to

act with sufficient urgency.



In the film 'Amazing Grace', **William Wilberforce** dramatically rolls out on the floor of the Commons thousands of signatures supporting the abolition of the Slave Trade. It was a long, hard fight to outlaw the Slave Trade and the struggle to end slavery still goes on. The churches had a chequered record but **John Wesley's** book 'Thoughts upon Slavery' (1774) was especially influential, inspiring Methodists, Presbyterians, Congregationalists, Baptists and Quakers to join the abolitionists.

The [Eco Church survey](#) encourages us to engage with local leaders and M.P.s on environmental issues and to participate in campaigns on national and global issues (see the section on Community and Local Engagement, nos 1, 2, 15 and 16). The current campaign for a **Climate and Nature Bill** promoted by **Zero Hour** (www.zerohour.uk) is a timely example. Maybe we can take inspiration

from our forebears? Perhaps you remember the campaign that led to the 2008 **Climate Change Act**: the UK was the first country to set legally binding emissions budgets and others have followed the UK's lead.

Alex Sobel, who is now Labour MP for the new constituency, Leeds Central and Headingley, originally introduced the Bill on 21 March. The measures include supporting UK farmers to cut emissions, restore nature and grow healthy, sustainable and affordable food.

Many organisations and individuals have already signed up to the campaign, including: The CofE Environment Programme, A Rocha, Christian Climate Action, Green Christian, Operation Noah, Tearfund and individual churches, including United Reformed Churches. Could you join them?

The year 2024 is the 350th anniversary of the birth of **Isaac Watts**, known worldwide as the "father of English hymnody". To mark his connections to this region, the East Midlands Synod is holding **A Celebration of Isaac Watts**, on Saturday 21 September from 2.30-4.00pm, with **gathering praise** from 2.00pm.

Melton Mowbray URC will host the event, commemorating his links with the Melton district. From 1696-99, Watts served the **Hartopp** family of Stoke Newington and Freeby. Alongside tutoring Mistress Mary Hartopp, his duties included preaching: he gave his first sermon on 17 July 1698, his

24th birthday. When accompanying the Hartopps to their Leicestershire seat, he led worship in Freeby's Congregational Chapel and two stained glass windows were later installed there to mark the connection. The chapel became a United Reformed Church in the 1970s and its congregation ultimately merged with that of Melton Mowbray.

Keynote speaker the **Revd Dr Robert Pope** of Westminster College will give short talks on the God of Isaac Watts and the continuing legacy of his hymnody. The event will also include an **Act of Thanksgiving** for his enduring gift to Christian life and of course, the opportunity to hear and sing several of Watts' best-known hymns. After singing lustily, attendees will be able to recharge with free refreshments including Melton Mowbray pork pies.

The event is **free of charge** but we ask you to register by visiting www.bit.ly/isaacwattscelebration (alternatively, call the Synod Office: 0115 960 9241). If possible, please book your place before 7 September so that we may judge numbers for catering.
